History Revisited: Light Shines in the Darkness

On March 11th, 2015, the Sisters of St. Chretienne lost a good friend in the person of Mr. Paul Piterman, a German Jew and survivor of the Holocaust. At ten years old, he, his two sisters and twenty-two other children were helped to escape the Nazi reign of terror through the courage of some persons working in the Belgian underground.

It was Sunday, December 13th, 1942, when, under the cover of darkness, young Paul and his companions



were shuffled off hastily and clandestinely to a Catholic convent school in Chimay, Belgium. Their first impressions: strange women dressed in black, a cross around their necks, a rosary hanging from the waist and speaking a foreign language. In

this sea of darkness, Paul asked himself, "What kind of a place is this?" Thus began his lifelong journey of association with the Sisters of St. Chretienne, who became his mothers, his friends, his teachers, and his protectors. In his own words he speaks affectionately to these Sisters. "You were a safe harbor, a gentle shore of dedication without measure, of feminine tenderness. You saved us from hunger, you played with us, you made us laugh. You helped make this time of terror bearable. You kept us standing upright at a great risk to your lives."

At the age of 83, Mr. Piterman had already devoted the last years of his retirement to research and documentation of the events between December 13th, 1942 and September 2nd, 1944. Paul, himself remained in Chimay until 1947. Having maintained an affectionate relationship with the Sisters of St. Chretienne all his life, his dream was to obtain from Yad Vashem, the Holocaust Martyrs' and Heroes' Remembrance Authority in Jerusalem, the Medal of the Righteous and the Certificate of Honor for the Sisters of St. Chretienne for their bravery in sheltering Jews during World War II. After a long investigation, Mr. Piterman and our Superior General received a letter from Yad Vashem in January, 2015

stating that the award would be given posthumously to Sister Marie Mechtilde, superior in Chimay at the time, in the name of the Sisters of St. Chretienne. Ordinarily, this award would be presented in an official public ceremony under the auspices of the Israeli Diplomatic Mission. With the sudden death of Mr. Piterman, this ceremony has yet to be organized. At any rate, Sister Marie Mechtilde's name will be inscribed on the wall of honor in the Garden of the Righteous at Yad Vashem in Jerusalem.

We Sisters of St. Chretienne remain very grateful to Mr. Piterman for his ongoing affection and devotion in pursuing this project until his death. This story has all the drama and intrigue of a good book and a fabulous movie, which were the next projects on Paul's to do list. We are blessed that our Sisters remained strong in their faith and committed to our mission during this troubling time in history and became models of hope and beacons of light in the darkness.

Personally, I had the privilege of getting to know Paul Piterman up close through correspondence on the internet, phone conversations and a one on



one visit in Metz, France in June, 2014. I will cherish these memories forever. Paul struck me as a man who was not em-

bittered by his past, but as someone who had made peace with it, a man with great moral integrity, a joyful spirit, affectionate and loyal. As a final note I would like to mention that Paul's parents were exterminated in Auschwitz. May God have mercy on man's inhumanity to man, then and now.

Rumford, Maine

This presentation was dedicated to all the men and women from the three parishes of St. Athanasius, St. John the Baptist, and St. Theresa of the Child Jesus and profiled the names and pictures of 52 vocations coming from these three parishes.

In his letter, Pope Francis urges religious to 'tell their stories'. The only story I could tell was my own and I did this, beginning with "the call" to religious life, the answer, and the ministry I was involved in for fifty years in Alberta, Canada, serving the native peoples of the Cree nation. Those who figured in the story: Fathers Jean Paul Vantroys and Father Rogier Vandersteene, both Oblates of Mary Immaculate, Sisters Jeanette Berger, Cecile Larue, Gertrude Girardin, Pearl Gallant and of course Gloria Bernard, Sisters of Saint Chretienne, all mentioned as models of consecrated life.

About twenty-five people from the parish were in attendance for the presentation, and all seemed to have enjoyed it.

The evening culminated with a drum song to Mary and a Cree blessing.

During the last seven years, Sister was a resident at the Bethany Health Care Center in Framingham, MA, where she endeared herself to the staff and visitors. She now rests in God's loving embrace.


